ACCA CELEBRATES 25 YEARS OF REHABILITATING HOMES

Spring 2014 marks the twenty-fifth year that ACCA has partnered with Rebuilding Together (formerly Christmas in April) to repair homes owned by low income homeowners and nonprofit groups. ACCA celebrated this milestone at the June ACCA Board meeting. We were joined by Rebuilding Together Arlington/Fairfax/Falls Church Executive Director Patti Klein and Marcy Bartlett. Rebuilding Together and ACCA recognized long-serving volunteers who have led the home repair projects and lunch preparation, as well as churches that have sponsored house projects. Patti Klein



presented plaques to ACCA and Housing Chair Marie Monsen. Over the 25 years, ACCA has repaired and refurbished 115 homes and group homes, improving safety of the homes and quality of life for the residents.

NEWS FROM THE COMMITTEES

Communications Committee—The Development Committee and Communications Committee collaborated in preparation of a new YouTube video about ACCA and its various ministries. Development Committee—The Committee is developing applications for grants from United Way and Washington Forrest Foundation, and is preparing for the fall Combined Federal Campaign and United Way campaign. The Committee is also completing the reporting requirements for the grants from the Fairfax County Community Consolidated Funding Pool and other sources. In recent months, ACCA received donations from community organizations, including the Lake Barcroft Women's Club and the Baileys' Rotary Club. ACCA is grateful for these donations.

Family Emergency Assistance—After several months of high need for assistance, requests slowed somewhat in May and June. ACCA gave a total of \$7962 in assistance for rent, utilities and medicine to 22 households in June. One of the families received help for medicine not covered by Medicaid that was needed to treat malaria. ACCA paid for the medication using the Annandale Rotary Club grant to the Family Emergency Assistance Committee for purchase of prescription medicine. ACCA also paid the first week's rent for a client who had a new job and was moving into an Oxford House residence.

Food Pantry—Pantry volunteers made 97 deliveries assisting 319 individuals in June. Donations of nonperishable food and paper goods are needed to keep the pantry stocked. Amy Metzel is leading an ACCA Community Garden effort which has yielded fresh vegetables for the Pantry.

Furniture—The Furniture Ministry volunteers completed deliveries to 33 households and picked up donations from 36 households during the month of June. In response to an appeal, bed linens were donated to ACCA. In addition, the Keys for the Homeless Foundation arranged for donation of 600 sheets from
